Theme: Traditional Knowledge & Medicine

**Prize:** 3 BC winners and a National winner each collect a \$150 prize. Group work is eligible for a shared prize.

Original youth photography, video and artwork accepted. Interview a local elder or show off your homemade salal tea on video? Creativity of all kinds is welcomed.

## **Contest Details:**

- Deadline: May 19, 2024 EMAIL or mail posters to education@foredbc.org.
- Open to all youths ages 5-18 with First Nations, Inuit, Metis, or self-declared ancestry.
- Participants must include their name, band affiliation or ancestry, home mailing address, phone & email address and grade, teacher & school on the back of all entries or in covering emails.
- Please include a brief description of how your work relates to traditional knowledge & medicine. (example below)
- All artistic mediums accepted: i.e. pencil, crayon, paint, mural, collage, photos, videos etc.
- Entries may be mailed or submitted electronically to education@foredbc.org as a photo or scanned (.jpg, .pdf, .png, .mp4, .MOV). Minimum image size 2MB. For large video files, use the free emailer WeTransfer (no sign-in required). Videos must be less than 3 min.
- By participating, winners agree that their names and posters can be published in local and social media, be displayed in BC Ministry of Education bulletin boards on Indigenous Day, June 21, and on our website.
- All entrants qualify for complimentary, honourary youth membership.
- Mailed entries cannot be returned. Only winners will be notified.

Traditional Knowledge/Medicine Example: Cedar Tree Traditional Uses Medicinal uses for cedar: oils for cleansing and tea for healing. Wet bark can be made into baskets, spoons, & strips for baskets. The First Nations relied on cedar to be the main source for transportation as they built rafts, canoes. Cedar is used in weapons because it is sturdy and really strong, in the handle of an ax or an arrow body. - Louise, Boston Bar, BC
